On Falling Short (DRAFT)

Many of us make easy peace with moral imperfection. In what sense do we “accept” our own moral shortcomings, though? And is it ever right to do so?

The Lure of Minimalism (DRAFT)

Philosophers often claim that human rights are “minimalistic,” or concerned only with the gravest harms. This claim fits poorly with the ambitiousness of human rights law, however. How to explain this divergence? And can it be justified?

Visions of Human Rights (DRAFT)

This book chapter provides an overview of the history of philosophical reflection about human rights through the 20th Century, with a focus on the Anglo-American philosophical tradition. Special attention is paid to how theorists have envisaged their role vis-à-vis the emergent practice of human rights.

Inducing Wonder (New Project)

We typically experience wonder at new, extraordinary sights. But we can also be made to feel wonder at quite ordinary things: chairs, toes, a blue sky, local customs, everyday assumptions, etc. This paper examines the nature, causes, and subversive power of such alienated experiences of the everyday.

Anger and Remorse (New Project)

We know that remorse, on the part of offenders, has a powerful capacity to abate anger, on the part of victims. This suggests that anger is a desire for recognition, not revenge. It also suggests that anger seeks the satisfaction of remorse itself.
